Course Description: This course provides a general introduction to the language disorders that are within the scope and practice of licensed Speech Language Pathologists providing assessment and treatment to patients across the lifespan.

Catalogue Description: Nature, theory, measurement, and management of language problems across the lifespan.

Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the linguistic, developmental and cultural bases of language disorders in children and adults.
2. Understand and identify the nature, extent, impact and potential causes of language disorders.
3. Demonstrate knowledge of and skill in approaches to language assessment and the basic principles of language intervention including writing outcomes.
4. Identify the tools necessary for analyzing language abilities at the pre-linguistic, single word, multi-word, sentence, and discourse levels.
5. Describe the general principles of assessment and intervention.
6. Explain the emergence and development of literacy and demonstrate knowledge of language disorders involving writing and reading.
7. Develop professional writing skills in genres appropriate to the discipline of Communication Sciences and Language Disorders.

Instructional Strategies and Activities:

- Guided Web-based exploration exercises and practices (Canvas, Master Clinician)
- Weekly reading assignments (textbook chapters and information on Canvas)
- Language disorder project (Video presentation and handout)
- Journal article reviews
- Clinical Analysis

Communication Disorders Profiles (30% of final grade). You will create communication disorder profiles that will help you identify and comprehend the characteristics of different communication disorders as well as appropriate assessment and intervention approaches for their treatment. Additional details posted in Canvas.

Analysis of Clinical Sessions (20% of final grade). You will observe and analyze videos of selected speech therapy sessions. Then you will compare and contrast clients and treatment approaches and discuss your impressions in a written format. Additional details posted in Canvas

Language Disorder Project (30% of final grade). You will select a condition associated with a communication disorder from a list provided by the instructor and conduct research to inform a 20-minute PowerPoint/video presentation and a handout. Additional details posted in Canvas.

Literacy-based Treatment Activity (20 % of final grade). Using a children's book of your choice you will: a) identify aspects of the book that can be used as examples of the different language domains and b) use this resource to develop treatment activities targeting all five domains of language including syntax, morphology, phonology, semantics, and pragmatics. Additional details posted in Canvas.

Missed Assignments:

All assignments are due on the dates indicated in the syllabus.

Late Work: Penalties will be incurred for assignments that are turned in after the due date. 10 points will be deducted each day the assignment is late, until the assignment is completed. For example, if an assignment is due by midnight on a Monday, and a student does not turn it in until Thursday evening, 30 points would be deducted in addition to points typically deducted for accuracy, etc.
